Themes paper, which includes Issues of Relationships, Issues of Life and Death, Issues of Good and Evil and Issues of Human Rights (2 hours)

- There will be four sections to this exam, one for each topic. Each section will consist of a 2 mark question, a 5 mark question, an 8 mark question and a 15 mark question (see exam structure section for more detail). The assessment is worth 50% of the qualification and has 120 marks (plus 6 for spelling, punctuation and grammar) Spelling, punctuation and grammar marks on question 1(d) ONLY. You must include a non-religious perspective in you answer to the Theme 2: Question (d) Life and Death.

EXAM THREE: Component 3: Study of a World Faith: Islam

Wednesday 8th June

Component 3: Study of a World Faith: Islam (1 hour)

There will be two sections to this exam, one for Muslim beliefs and teachings and one for Muslim Practices. Each section will consist of a 2 mark question, a 5 mark question, an 8 mark question and a 15 mark question (see exam structure section for more detail). This examination is worth 25% of the qualification and is worth 60 marks. There are no additional marks available for spelling, grammar and punctuation

Structure of exam questions

- **2 mark question – ‘State’.** You will need to recall one of the topics key concept words *e.g. state what is meant by the term stewardship*
- **5 mark question – ‘Describe’.** You will need to describe key beliefs, practices or viewpoints from one or two religions. *E.g. Describe religious beliefs about the sanctity of life*
- **8 mark question – ‘Explain’.** You will need to explain, from two different religions or two different religious viewpoints (two different views from the same religion *e.g. Sunni Muslims and Shi’a Muslims or Catholic Christians and Protestant Christians*) their beliefs on a topic *e.g. ‘Explain from two religious traditions or religions, their attitudes towards women leading worship’*. Your answer should follow the PEEI (point, explain, evidence, impact) structure.
- **15 mark question – ‘Discuss’.** You will need to discuss (provide more than one point of view) on a statement that you are presented. *E.g. ‘All religious people should disagree with the death penalty’*. In your response to these questions, you should follow the SONIC structure and you will need to;
 - Ensure that you present more than one point of view
 - Refer to religion and belief in your answer
 - Refer to non-religious views, such as those held by atheists and Humanists in 2D (Life and Death 15 mark question)
 - Reach a justified conclusion of the strongest argument presented

The areas that are highlighted in yellow align with the exam boards advanced notice for the 15 mark questions and topic which they will assess.
